Background

EU macro-regional strategy (MRS) is a multi-agent system inhabited by many autonomous agents –countries and regions, ministries, agencies, municipalities, national and panregional institutions, financing programmes, civil society organisations and groups; we call them all 'stakeholders'. In the systems theory language, they are 'interconnected elements or actors', and each one somehow relates and contributes to the MRS mission. Therefore, their agendas and resources must be purposefully streamlined towards a shared purpose.


The ultimate intent of the four MRS is to serve as an instrument of cohesion in Europe. This is a given, foundational piece of MRS DNA – on which we build them as systems that gather and align resources for producing outcomes such as cohesive policies, aligned institutional agendas, more efficient use of financial recourses, and broader stakeholder inclusion. However, this is easier said than done – because each stakeholder is a system per se, with its own intent (vision), politically informed environment (conditions, context), dedicated resources, formed performance models, capability to adjust and respond to change, preferred outcomes and evaluation criteria. Stakeholders create systems in a larger system!

MRS is formed upon variety and diversity of systems. Taking into account the aim of the "Capacity building programme for capacity builders in the MRS", in Module 2, we will be exploring a Thematic Area as the system. Thematic Area¹, in many ways, is a fractal reflection of the MRS as a system:

- it has thematic objectives (missions) of its own,
- it is in service of cohesion, i.e. aim to align national and institutional agendas of their members,
- they resource the implementation of actions in the macro-region.

The Thematic Area as a system gives enough complexity to explore it to search for better outcomes and overall health cues. Practising systems analysis will enable you to explore any other systems at play in the MRS and the MRS as such.
